Duke Anthony Whitmore/Henry Louis Gates, Jr. Academic Achievement Wall

The wall was originally conceived to recognize the academic and scholarly activities of Potomac State College's students, alumni, and faculty.

During the early deliberations, the College planned to name the wall in honor of Henry Louis Gates, Jr., Ph.D., who attended Potomac State and now serves as chair of Harvard's Department of African American Studies. He is recognized as one of the most powerful academic voices in America and in 1997 was voted one of Time magazine's "25 Most Influential Americans."



When Dr. Gates entered Potomac State, his intention was to become a physician. That ambition was short-lived; however, when he was introduced to the captivating world of language and literature by Professor Tony "Duke" Whitmore, Ph.D. Dr. Gates credits Dr. Whitmore with forever changing his life and consequently helping to redefine the meaning of America through the research of Dr. Gates and his colleagues.

Upon Dr. Whitmore's death during the planning stages of the wall, Dr. Gates requested that the name of the wall be changed to include the name of Dr. Tony "Duke" Whitmore, so that the student and his mentor may be honored together. Each year a faculty committee selects up to three students who exhibit exemplary scholarship and potential for continued achievement.

The committee may also select a former faculty member of the College who has produced a scholarly work, publication, or performance. An alumni committee selects former students of the College who meet the same criteria.

The first year's inductees also included students who had been recognized as the Outstanding Student of the Year from its inception in 1983.

HISTORY OF SIGMA PHI OMEGA AT WVU POTOMAC STATE COLLEGE

Sigma Phi Omega was founded in the spring of 1923 by the faculty of Potomac State College. Their desire was to create an organization which would serve as a medium for social contact between themselves and outstanding students. The name "Sigma Phi Omega" was chosen by using the initial letters of the Greek words which mean "student-faculty organization."

Thirteen students, eight men and five women, were the first honored with membership. The speaker for that occasion was Thomas R. Carskadon, formerly of Keyser, and candidate for vice president of the United States.

Sigma Phi Omega also has a strong history of public service. During World War II, the society sold war bonds and defense stamps as its contributions to the war effort, raising over \$15,000. The society has contributed through the years to the Nancy M. Miller, Ph.D. Scholarship Fund. Dr. Miller served as adviser to the society from 1949-1967.

The first faculty adviser was Claire Adler, who helped found the organization. Wilhelmine Deissle served from 1925-1949. Faculty Emeritus Kenneth Haines became advisor in 1967 and served until his retirement in 1996. Faculty Emerita Dinah Courier served from 1996 until her retirement in 2009. Professor Andrea Bucklew, J.D. and Vicki Huffman, Ph.D. then served as co-advisors. Dr. Vicki Huffman and Dr. Sheri Chisholm, are the current co-advisors.

The four-fold Sigma Phi Omega emblem represents fellowship, pure motives, trust in God, and clear thinking through education. These traits are reflected in the initiation obligation, a poem written by Henry van Dyke, an American author, educator and clergyman who was born in 1852 and died in 1933:

*“Four things a man must learn to do if
he would make his record true:
To think without confusion clearly;
To love his fellow-men sincerely;
To act from honest motive purely;
To trust in God and Heaven securely.”*

HISTORY OF SIGMA ALPHA RHO AT WVU POTOMAC STATE COLLEGE

The nursing honor society, today known as Sigma, was founded as Sigma Theta Tau in 1922 by six nursing students here in the United States, at Indiana University. From those six founding members, the organization has grown to more than 135,000 active members, in over 500 chapters, in over 90 countries around the world. Sigma collaborates with several global organizations to improve the health of the world's people, including representation at the United Nations. This offers members the opportunity to extend their reach outside of their own communities. Sigma members are leaders at all levels of the healthcare industry. The society only extends membership to students in baccalaureate or graduate level programs who have demonstrated superior academic achievement, academic integrity, and professional leadership potential and to nurse leader candidates exhibiting exceptional achievements in nursing.

Our founders chose the Greek Letters – Sigma, Theta, Tau – from the Greek words meaning Love, Courage, and Honor, as they believed them to be the enduring values that are the root of the nursing profession. Our crest symbolizes these enduring values, reminding us of our commitment to:

- Wisdom and discernment, as represented by the eye;
- Service, professional endeavor, and strength of leadership, as represented by the pillars of stone at the right and left; and
- Knowledge, as represented by the lamp.

Our key reminds us of our charge to uphold love, courage, and honor and is a symbol of scholarship.

- The cup denotes the satisfaction of professional life;
- The circle with its six stars represents our six founders;
- The lamp is the lamp of knowledge; and
- The letters in black represent our charge.

This key symbolizes our commitment to nursing excellence.

The Alpha Rho chapter of Sigma began on the WVU Morgantown campus in 1966 and inducted its first Keyser campus students in 2020.

HISTORY OF PHI THETA KAPPA – BETA PSI CHI AT WVU POTOMAC STATE COLLEGE

Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, headquartered in Jackson, Mississippi, is the largest honor society in higher education with nearly 1,300 chapters on college campuses in all 50 of the United States, plus Canada, Germany, the Republic of Palau, Peru, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, the British Virgin Islands, the United Arab Emirates, and U.S. territorial possessions. More than 3.5 million students have been inducted since its founding in 1918, with over 250,000 active members annually.

To fulfill our mission, we focus on recognizing and encouraging the academic achievement of college students while providing opportunities for individual growth and development through participation in honors, leadership, service, and fellowship programming.

Spring 2022 represented the induction of the first class of PTK-BSC students on the WVU Potomac State College Campus.
